"I was in the middle of Nevada," he recalls, "And I said absolutely not. I had just finished paramedic school and was thinking of looking for a job with a fire department in San Diego."

But actress Lilly McDowell, the setup in question, was hopeful. "Something about the way our friend Gene talked about Charlie—how deep and thoughtful he was—made me know I'd connect with him," she says. So she waited. "Gene would call and say, 'Okay, he's on his way, he'll be here in a week.... Now he's in San Francisco, driving down the coast." Once Charlie arrived in Los Angeles, he met Gene for drinks—and Gene brought Lilly.

"It was instant," says Lilly. "We talked the whole night and felt completely at ease with each other, like we were old friends." Charlie was equally smitten, so much so that he opted out of moving to San Diego altogether.

Fast-forward four years to their 2009 engagement, which also took an unexpected turn (as did Charlie's career plans—he's now getting his Ph.D. in clinical psychology). Lilly's stepsister Kate and her husband, Jesse, invited them on a trip to Paris over New Year's Eve, and Charlie drummed up a plan. "I thought we'd go for a walk, and I'd find some picturesque place to pop the question," he says. "But I never found the right spot." Instead, he asked Lilly to marry him in the bedroom of the apartment they had rented, while Kate and Jesse waited outside with Champagne.

The location for the wedding, however, was a clear choice. Lilly wanted to get married at the Martha's Vineyard home of her mother and stepfather, actors Mary Steenburgen and Ted Danson. Charlie, who grew up in Concord, Massachusetts, felt a special connection to the area as well.

Lilly and event planner Emily Kelly, who had planned Kate and Jesse's wedding, shared

a love of antiquing and crafting. The overall look—a mix of Parisian flea market finds, travel memorabilia, and a few nautical touches—came together from thrift-shopping trips, elements pulled from Lilly's own home, and projects she tackled with friends.

"I wanted to be really involved from day one," says Lilly. "Luckily, I have an amazing group of girlfriends whose idea of a perfect evening is to open up a bottle of wine and create something." One such wine-and-craft night involved labeling custom candle favors from Nell's Compass, owned by Lilly and her mother. Another was spent sewing garlands made of old maps and book pages.

With Emily's help, Lilly also scoured flea markets for vintage postcards, which they scanned and reprinted as escort cards. And on the morning of the wedding, they hung letters spelling out "Just Married" from the trees above the shaded walkway on the property that led from the ceremony to the reception.

On the afternoon of September 25, 2010, their 180 guests were enchanted at every turn—but her mother was the most delighted of all. "I was so impressed by every one of Lilly's creative touches, and even more impressive was her total cool when the inevitable little things went wrong," Mary says.

Charlie, for one, remembers the slightly off moments as some of his favorites. "During the ceremony, Lilly's veil was whipping around in the wind. All of a sudden she just said, 'I don't think I need this,' and took it off. It made the day seem much more real."

As for Lilly's most cherished memory? "I loved reading the letters we wrote to each other as vows. Mine was about how we met, our relationship, and how we got there," she says. "But Charlie's was totally not what I imagined. It was all about our future."

The Party

THE FRUIT BASKETS

Fresh berries offer a summertime alternative to candy on your dessert bar-and pair perfectly with fruit pies and tarts. Display them in market "baskets" made of porcelain. Simply stagger a few around the sweets station, or place a trio at every table for guests to enjoy. The best part? You'll be able to use them long after your big day (\$20 to \$38, jayson homeandgarden.com).









THE MEDALLION

- 1. Cut two 2½-by-11-inch strips of vintage map paper (ours is from touchofeurope.net).
- 2. Make creases every ½ inch with a bone folder to create its accordion style. With doublesided tape, connect the two

pieces to form one long strip. Use a needle and thread to sew through each panel at one end. Pull the thread so the strip forms a circle, and tie. Join the first and last panels with double-sided tape. 3. Punch a 2-inch circle from card stock (we like Uchida's 2-inch circle

punch, \$14, amazon.com); hotglue it to the back of the medallion. Print the drink label (download it at marthastewartweddings.com /summer2011), and hot-glue it to the medallion's front. Cut a ribbon to go around the drink vessel, and two for tails. Attach with glue.

THE RING BOX

- 1. Cut a piece of foam batting to fit the inside of your box. Fold fabric around it and cut, leaving ½ inch extra around the edges. Fold it in half, wrong sides facing out, and sew two sides together. Turn the pouch right side out, and stuff with the batting. Stitch up the open side, tucking raw edges to the inside. 2. Sew two or three buttons on top
- of the pillow, and tie twine around them to hold the rings.

THE WELCOME BAGS

Lilly and Charlie's totes were screen-printed, but you can get the look with the design below. Download it from our site, print it onto iron-on paper, and transfer it to your bags following the manufacturer's instructions. Then fill 'em up with goodies.

THE CHAIR GARLAND

- 1. Collect papers, pages from old books, and maps (find great examples at touchofeurope.net). Cut them into 1- and 3-inch rounds with craft punches. To make the chain, put a piece of double-sided tape on the back of one circle, press white twine onto the tape, and then place a samesize circle (with another strip of tape) over the first.
- 2. Repeat along the length of the twine, mixing up the sizes as you go.







THE NAPKINS

Fold your napkins in thirds, then use tape to affix a stencil to the center. Soak a small foam brush in fabric paint, and dab it over the letters. Allow to dry for at least 30 minutes.
